| 11. Skills for Breastfeeding Challenges which are Encountered Infrequently: The following issues are encountered relatively infrequently, and may not be seen during the student's training. The entry-level lactation consultant would not be expected to be proficient in these situations. The student will need to use basic skills to assist the mother and infant while seeking guidance from a more experienced IBCLC. | |
| 11.1 Infant with tonic bite/ineffective/dysfunctional suck | 15, 23, 35, 39 |
